John has been a leader in Virginia High School sports for many years. He served as the first President of the Virginia High School Athletic Directors Association helping to form that group in 1973. He has served the BSC in many ways both as a speaker and advisor on our Awards committee. He has had several articles published at the national level concerning athletic administration. John has been the featured speaker at many civic and professional meetings and banquets.
